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

### Register to vote

Don't forget to return your household enquiry form to make sure you're eligible to vote at the next election.

These forms have been sent to every home in Norwich as part of our annual canvas, which is a legal requirement. If your household's details haven't changed, you can let us know by returning your form by post or by informing us online, by text or by telephone.

If you have new residents to add or you need to remove anyone, you will need to tell us by returning your form by post or informing us online.

#### What happens next?

When we receive your form, any previously unregistered members of your household will be invited to register to vote.

Our canvassers will be visiting properties where we have not received responses, so you may see them out and about in your area in the coming weeks.

Calling all 16 to 17-year-olds! This may be your first opportunity to register so make sure your name is added to your household's enquiry form.

### Did you know?

You need to be on the electoral register not only to vote but to be able to apply for credit such as mobile phone contracts and mortgages.

From Big Weekend to the Lord Mayor's Celebration, Norwich has hosted some show-stopping events this year... and there's more to come!

he year 2015 has proved to be a real gem, with thousands of people pouring into Earlham Park in May to be part of Europe's biggest free ticketed music festival to see headline acts such as Taylor Swift, Foo Fighters, George Ezra and Florence and the Machine.

And after a short skip and a hop from Big Weekend, the city council's events team was busy gearing up for the jam-packed Lord Mayor's Celebration in July. With the familiar procession and breathtaking fireworks display, there was a brand new attraction at this year's event – a giant waterslide, which raised valuable money for charity.

Alan Waters, leader of the council, said: "In many ways, 2015 saw Norwich at its best when it came to the events we hosted. It shows what a diverse city Norwich is when it can attract artists of the calibre we saw at Big Weekend.

"Then, just a few weeks later, it was on with the Lord Mayor's Celebration which showed the city off like no other annual event of the year can. And let's not forget, in between these two huge events, we were able to let Canaries fans enjoy a slice of history by being photographed with the play-off trophy that was temporarily on display in City Hall following the club's promotion to the Premier League."

### A medieval jewel at the heart of our city

he Halls in Norwich was sold to the city in 1538 following a successful petition sent to Henry VIII, granted on the understanding that it would be used for the good of its citizens for fairs and feasting - a pledge still in evidence today.

Whether it's the annual beer festival, vintage clothes or record fairs, or an orchestral performance, many of us have had the chance to visit The Halls to enjoy one of the various events it now plays host to. With so much going on inside, it can be easy to overlook the historical significance of this beautiful building.

The Halls makes up the most complete surviving medieval friary complex in the country and is a Grade I listed Scheduled Monument due to its national importance.

St Andrews Hall is perhaps the best known of the collection, with its hammer-beamed roof, splendid arched columns and

stunning stained glass windows. The hall has traditionally been used for a multitude of functions from royal banquets to international table tennis.

The Norwich Triennial Festival. now the ever popular Norfolk and Norwich Festival, began at the Halls in 1824.

The complex is also home to the country's largest collection of civic portraits, with 127 late-16th to 19th century paintings of Norwich mayors, sheriffs and other dignitaries, including a large portrait of Admiral Lord Nelson, which is on display in Blackfriars Hall.

### **Tackling low salaries**

week of activities aimed at pushing for better salaries for Norwich's lowest paid workers is planned for November.

The activities are to coincide with Living Wage Week, which takes place across the country every year.

The UK Living Wage, as defined by Living Wage Foundation, is currently £7.85 per hour for those outside London and is the amount needed to maintain a 'normal' standard of living. This is higher than the current minimum wage. Events and activities to promote awareness of the Living Wage celebrate those employers already signed up to paying it and encourage those who aren't to do so.

Activities are due to be hosted by a number of organisations including Aviva, Future Projects, and various trade unions across the city throughout the week, with the main events taking place from Sunday 1 to Saturday 7 November.

Councillor Vaughan Thomas, cabinet member for fairness and equality, said: "The city council

believes everyone in Norwich deserves a decent standard of living, whereas, here, more than one in four employees earns less than £7 per hour.

"In-work poverty is a significant problem and the Living Wage directly addresses this. Insufficient income, which is the root cause of poverty and hardship, excludes people from fully participating in the life of our city and from achieving their full potential. I hope there will be something for everyone during our second Living Wage Week."

Tony Gammage, chairman of Living Wage Norwich, said: "We believe that paying a Living Wage makes good sense for employees, businesses and the whole local economy. It is about moving as many people as possible from the minimum wage and just surviving onto a wage on which they can plan and build a future.

"We are a charity with no political bias and we want to encourage employers to take part and become accredited."

The Living Wage is one which pays enough for workers to



have the opportunities and choices necessary to properly participate in society.

The benefits for businesses in becoming accredited include a reduction in staff turnover and sickness, an improvement in morale and productivity and beyond that, creating a 'virtuous circle' with higher pay spent locally, boosting the local economy.

Here, 28 per cent of families are classed as deprived and 31 per cent of children as living in poverty. Norwich employees are, on average, paid 13.5 per cent less than full-time employees in the UK, which means many thousands are paid well below the current Living Wage.

### Go superfast with your business

here's still time for local businesses to boost their broadband connection through the government's Superfast **Britain Broadband Connection** Vouchers scheme.

If you're a business owner based in the Norwich City Council area and have fewer than 250 employees, you're likely to be eligible for a grant of between £100 and £3.000.

It can fund associated installation costs including infrastructure equipment, construction charges, engineering works and surveys.

The offer is also open to registered charities, social enterprises and sole traders, even if they're based at home.

Multiple organisations can also apply together and pool the funding, as long as the individual businesses meet the scheme's eligibility criteria. This can help where a whole office block wants to team up to get superfast broadband.

Benefits include improved customer experience, faster file sharing and reduced software and hardware costs.

As more businesses in the city get better connected through the scheme. we asked East Coast Air Conditioning, "What's life like since going superfast?"

Here's what its owner Martin Rand had to say: What was the situation like before?

Shockingly bad. It took ages to send an email and the system could only cope with one attachment at a time, which was very frustrating. External emails would often get delayed for several hours and then come through all at once, which meant that urgent messages weren't getting picked up quickly enough.

Although the main problem was with emails, it did affect web access too and meant that some days staff could not log on to internet

banking accounts to carry out everyday financial admin. It really did have a negative impact on the general running of the business.

### How's it been since the upgrade?

The internet connection speed has rocketed, going from about 0.8mb/sec to 57mb/sec.

Everything online is so much quicker and easier to access emails can be sent and received without a delay and online banking accessed easily. It has really improved the day-to-day business.

Also, spare parts can now be ordered from suppliers through their websites, whereas before staff had to resort to doing this over the phone, which often meant waiting a long time in a call queue.

### Call goes out to 'Get involved'

ver fancied trying your hand at gardening or healthy cooking? Perhaps you'd jump at the chance to roll up your sleeves and join other volunteers in a litter pick of Twenty Acre Wood; or what about helping to put on a local community festival?

If you're really keen to volunteer in your local community but don't know how to get started, we're here to point you in the right direction.

Norwich has a vast number of individuals and community groups who give up their time to a wide range of activities; all of which add up to making Norwich an even safer, cleaner, more enjoyable place to live, work and visit.

A good number of these have come together with

Norwich City Council to host 'Get involved' week from Monday 28 September to Sunday 4 October.

Groups from across the city will host a range of taster activities that will be open to others. These will range from a coffee morning on Ipswich Road to a bicycle refurbishment workshop on King Street. You might want to go along to sessions aimed at brightening up local parks and open spaces off Grapes Hill, the centre of Bowthorpe, Eaton or Heigham Parks, or even Marston Marsh.

Alternatively, you could have a go at honing wood or metal work skills or take part in an art session at The Forum – just some of the things on offer.

The satisfaction you can get from working in your local

community can be priceless, and the activities on offer all week are designed to open up these opportunities to even more people who may want to 'Get involved'. It's anticipated that the activities will attract new members to existing groups, who often need some extra help from those who share an interest in playing an active role in their neighbourhood.

So, whatever part of the city you live in, there should be something nearby that you can try as a one-off or discover more about.

The city is very grateful to the many people who already volunteer in their community, so why not go and join them?

### Waste and recycling news

### Waste less, recycle more

Top tips on how to keep your recycling in tip-top condition and handy hints on how to waste less are being offered by experts at Norwich City Council as part of a drive to reduce, reuse and recycle.

Councillor Keith Driver, cabinet member for recycling, said: "Since we launched the **Recycling Revolution last** October, people in the city have been brilliant.

"They're clearly recycling more and making the effort to put all the new materials they can recycle into their blue bins and sacks.

"Now we are keen to give some hints and tips to improve things even further and help us make sure that the recycling being sent to the Costessey plant is clean and correct. But we are also looking more and more at trying to help people to produce less waste in the first place."

#### Top tips for recycling:

Check your bin collection calendar or visit www.norwich.gov.uk/ wasteandrecycling to make sure you know what can and cannot be recycled in your blue bin or sack.

- Please make sure you rinse your recycling to remove any food or liquid residue. You only need to quickly rinse items with water but you can also wash them up or put items like glass jars in your dishwasher if you want to.
- If you collect recycling in a carrier or plastic bag, please make sure you empty the bag into your bin. Please don't put carrier bags full of recycling in your bin, recycling must be loose so it can be easily sorted.
- You can take items that are not accepted in your recycling bin to the Swanton Road Household Recycling Centre for free, or you can pay a small charge to have bulky waste like mattresses and fridges collected from your home.
- Use your food waste caddy to recycle leftovers and spoiled food into soil enhancer.
- Consider composting your vegetable peelings and egg shells to produce your own fertiliser.

### Good ways to produce less waste:

- Where you can, plan meals and shopping so you don't buy too much food which then ends up going off and being thrown away.
- Do regular fridge checks to spot foods coming up to their use-by date so you can plan to eat them before they spoil.
- Use your freezer wisely. Freeze suitable foods (bread, raw meats) to keep them for another time, or freeze meal leftovers where possible.
- Stop junk mail and switch to paperless billing.
- Try to fill up re-useable bags when you go shopping, rather than using disposable carrier bags.
- Consider selling unwanted items or donating them to charity shops rather than throwing them away.
- Donate unwanted small electricals at one of our regular local events.





### A parking plea

A plea is being made to car drivers to park carefully in Norwich's narrow residential streets so access is not restricted for larger vehicles.

There have been almost daily instances where waste and recycling trucks, which are about 2.5m wide and 11m long. have been unable to access streets because of cars parked too far from the kerb.

This can mean that a round cannot be completed or is delayed significantly while the truck reverses and takes another route. In the picture above, bin collections from this particular street were

delayed by three days because of this issue.

Councillor Keith Driver, cabinet member for recycling, said: "We know that the vast majority of car drivers park well but we just want to give a little nudge to those who don't take enough care.

"Large vehicles like bin trucks and delivery lorries need to access roads every week to provide vital services and, in emergencies, large vehicles like fire engines need to be able to get down a road."

Please park close and parallel to the kerb and try to avoid leaving your vehicle with the wheel turning into the street.

### **Recycling success**

A huge thanks is being issued to everyone who made our latest electricals recycling event the biggest success yet.

It was held on Saturday 27 June at City Academy in Earlham Road.

Cllr Driver continued: "It was the most successful event we've ever held. There was a constant stream of cars all morning and, in total, four vans were filled from floor to ceiling with various electricals – almost double that of previous events."

Three vans were filled with more than 300 re-sale items at a value of £4,293 for Norwich's local British Heart Foundation shop. The remaining van was packed with more than 500 items (for recycling), weighing in at more than 2,000kg.

### Helping hand for older residents

The HandyVan scheme has been helping older residents across the city stay safe in their homes since it was launched in January.

n the space of just a few months it has already helped lots of people over the age of 65 with everyday small repairs and jobs around the home, such as building furniture and putting up shelves.

The service is totally free for eligible residents in receipt of council tax reduction and older people who do not qualify for free can still use the service via a nominal £15 labour charge.

### HandyVan happy customer

Mary Phillips is 84 and lives on her own. She said: "I can look after myself but I can't reach to change lightbulbs and I'm no good at fixing things. I don't have any family or friends locally who can help me either.

"I first used the HandyVan service to get my phone line extended. I used to miss a lot of calls as the phone would stop ringing before I could get to it and I found it difficult to use the answerphone. Now I can use my phone while sitting on the sofa.



"I was also worried about tripping over in my flat, as my carpet was starting to come away from the fixings. I called Handy Van and the man came and stuck it down.

"I'd been finding it harder to get in and out of my flat and he was also able to put grab rails near my front door to help me get in and out more easily.

"I have trouble picking things up off the floor and my friend had very kindly bought me a postbox to go inside my front door, but I wasn't able to fit it. The HandyVan man fixed it to the door so now I can get my post without struggling to bend down.

"These small things have made a big difference to my day-today living and helped me feel safer and more independent

in my home. I wouldn't have been able to afford to pay someone to do these things for me, so this service is a real blessing."

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### **Norwich Market**

### Tell us what you think

embers of the public far and wide are being asked to give their views on the much-loved Norwich Market.

Our special 25-question survey aims to gather information about what people think of the market, how they shop, and what improvements they consider should be made to assure its future.

Council officers are also keen to assess how recent new street signs and web pages have been received and to gather data about the customer profile of people who visit the historic shopping area.

Councillor Paul Kendrick, cabinet member for Norwich Market, said: "This survey is an important piece of work which we hope will return some extremely useful information. Norwich Market is very close to the heart of many people and is an absolutely key part of our

city so we hope lots of people will respond and get involved."

The council is keen to hear from regular market visitors, as well as businesses and people who don't routinely use the market but have a view on its future.

Among the topics covered in the survey are whether people feel the market is an important part of the city, whether they regularly browse there and, if not, reasons why they stay away.

It explores how much people spend on an average visit and the types of things they shop for, and also asks what, if anything, is missing from the current market offering.

The information gathered from the responses will be used to help shape a new 10-year market strategy, currently under development.

The survey is available online at www.norwich.gov.uk/ norwichmarket and under the current consultations section.

Paper copies are also available from market stalls or at City Hall.

People can drop completed surveys into one of the special boxes held on the following stalls: Mike, Debs, and Sons Fruit and Veg, Harvey's Cards and Taxi Vintage Clothing.

The survey is open until Wednesday 30 September.





### **Music matters**

very year the newly appointed Lord Mayor I and Sheriff of Norwich choose a civic charity to help raise money for and support.

### **Mousehold Heath heroes**

ousehold Heath is a truly special place: a wildlife haven, teaming with lizards, butterflies, dragonflies, woodpeckers, even the occasional sparrowhawk or kestrel. It's a favourite walking spot for many dog owners, host to football matches, pitch and putt games, guided walks, concerts and more.

The city council's responsibility for the day-to-day management of the heath is overseen by Mousehold Heath Conservators

- made up of councillors, representatives of professional bodies and members of the public. There is also an independent voluntary action group called The Mousehold Heath Defenders. established in 1972 to protect it.

There are many other volunteers who work alongside the conservators and council to maintain and improve the heath. In the last seven years there have been more than 24,000 hours some 4.300 of these in 2015 so far – of volunteer work put into

the heath, with a lot of time dedicated to clearing scrub, picking up litter and repairing paths.

In addition to making the heath a better place for its wildlife and visitors, volunteers find they get a good deal of satisfaction, a vigorous workout and a new set of friends when they pitch in at the heath.

## **Get ready for Universal Credit**



The new monthly payment that will go on to replace six key working-age benefits will start to arrive in Norwich this December.

Which benefits will Universal Credit replace?

- Jobseeker's Allowance
- Employment and Support Allowance
- Income Support
- Child Tax Credit
- Working Tax Credit
- Housing Benefit

If you are currently claiming any of these benefits, you won't be affected until you are contacted about transferring to **Universal Credit.**

New claimants of Jobseeker's Allowance will be the first affected by Universal Credit, which will eventually include all working-age benefit claimants.

The practical requirements of Universal Credit are skills that all of us need to keep on top of to make sure we can access essential services and manage our finances.

### Tips for a smooth **Universal Credit journey**

Get online... applications for Universal Credit will be made on the internet. This means you will need to have your own email address and have access to your online Universal Credit account.

If you are not able to get online, there is lots of local support available to help you. Speak to your local library or the job centre to find out more.

Don't forget - Barclays Digital Eagles are on hand at The Forum in Norwich every second Tuesday of the month for any digital enquiries.

Get a bank account... with benefits being combined into one monthly payment, you will need to make sure you have a bank account that can receive automated payments.

The right bank account can make it easier to manage your finances as it will allow you to receive payments and set up direct debits to pay bills.

Get budgeting... make sure your monthly payment covers all your outgoings by using a budget planner or seeking money advice.

Check your entitlement – even if you don't currently claim any of these benefits, it is always worth checking what you could be eligible for. Find out at www.entitledto.co.uk.

Any housing element that is paid as part of your Universal Credit to cover rent will be paid directly to you, and will be your responsibility to pay to your landlord.



### Cycling for the future

**PUSH** THE PEDALWAYS

s work to the eight-mile pink pedalway is approaching the final phase, the next set of projects is getting underway with plans to upgrade the blue and yellow pedalway routes.

But improving the pedalways is not just about building better space for cycling – it's about the wider benefits it will bring to the city.

Both of the cycle routes cross the city centre and will make connections out in to Greater Norwich – the yellow pedalway between Norwich International Airport and The University Technical College in Lakenham and the blue pedalway from Sprowston to Wymondham.

This ties it in with growth plans for the city over the next decade by connecting Norwich with nearby towns, employment centres, educational institutions and growth areas within commuting distance by bike.

There are nearly 77,000 existing and up to 13,000 planned jobs within this area so making them easy to reach is an essential part of fuelling economic growth. In terms of housing, currently 76,000 residents over the age of 12 live within 400m of the blue and yellow pedalways, with the figure likely to reach 94,000 by 2026.

The infrastructure to support communities as they grow is vital and, as part of this, the provision of good quality

cycle routes will help prevent this development from generating an excessive rise in cars on our roads.

Finally, bringing health benefits to the area through encouraging cycling is a major driving force for this work. Decreasing prevalence of obesity, increasing mobility and lowering the rates of cardio-vascular and other diseases are all benefits associated with cycling cities.

By providing high quality routes that will encourage residents to cycle in their day-to-day lives, we hope that Norwich will see all these benefits over the years to come.

### **National Fraud Initiative** 2015-16

orwich City Council has a duty to protect the public funds it administers and may use the information you provide for the prevention and detection of fraud.

It can also share this information with other bodies responsible for auditing or overseeing public funds for these purposes.

The Cabinet Office requires the council to take part in its anti-fraud initiative. It has asked for information about payroll, housing benefits, housing rents and right to buy, market rents, street traders, council tax, insurance claimants, taxi driver licences, personal licences to supply alcohol, residential parking permits, electoral register, and trade creditors.

### Talking about our river

he River Wensum runs through the heart of Norwich but what was once the focus of city life has, for many people, faded into the background, despite its prominent location.

With this in mind, a new partnership has been set up to put the spotlight back on this wonderful natural asset by developing a strategy for the river within the city, plus the area including Whitlingham Broad.



Norwich City Council is leading on the project, working in partnership with the Broads Authority, Norfolk County Council, Environment Agency, as well as the Wensum River Parkway Partnership.

Work on the document has got off to a good start with more than 150 people taking part in a consultation that asked for views on the proposed strategy area and its objectives, on top of any issues it should address and opportunities it can explore.

Responses from the public and stakeholders have varied widely with suggestions for new business ideas, access points and leisure activities.

This, along with other evidence, will help the partnership to draft the strategy and action plan, which will then be consulted upon in the next few months.

Councillor Mike Stonard, chair of the River Wensum strategy partnership, said: "We've really enjoyed getting people talking about the river over the recent months.

"By asking the public and stakeholders their views and sharing expertise between partners, we are well placed to develop a strategy that will make the most of this beautiful natural asset over the coming years."

### **Great solar savings**

undreds of homes across Norwich and Norfolk are due to have solar panels installed this autumn at a fraction of the market price, thanks to an innovative scheme led by Norwich City Council. Solar Together Norfolk was the first UK scheme of its kind and was run by Norwich City, Broadland District, South Norfolk and North Norfolk councils in partnership with specialist collective purchasing company iChoosr.

A total of 3,379 households and businesses across the county registered and were subsequently offered average savings of 16 per cent on solar panels for their homes and offices. This works out at a saving of about £1,100 off the market price.

The scheme gives homeowners the chance to make a good investment in their properties as well as benefiting from sustainable, clean and



environmentally-friendly energy - saving on energy bills, and earning from the power they generate.

The work comes with a guarantee and the panels are quality products fitted by a reputable installer.
